School Places

2012 has seen an unprecedented rise in the number of applications for children starting school. As a result, nine extra classes have been created at schools across the borough. This includes an extra class at both Caversham Primary and Emmer Green Primary School.

It is suggested that the increased demand results partly from a high level of inward migration into the town for work, combined with the poor economic climate leading to more families remaining in smaller starter homes.

Reading Borough Council is predicting the increased demand seen this year, will continue for at least the next four years. Planning for additional school places in the borough is already underway, starting with Head Teachers.

Understandably, this pressure is causing anxiety for parents and the increasing demand for



secondary places at Highdown School is also an issue. The CADRA committee therefore decided to invite the Head of Education Services to come and speak in Caversham. As in 2009, the topic will be, 'More School Places', covering both primary and secondary schools in Reading.

Kevin McDaniel and Myles Milner will set out the current position and explain the process for deciding where and how further places should be provided. They will be pleased to answer questions and hear concerns. The meeting is open to all so please let your family and friends know. There will be a membership table in the hall to sign up new members and handle renewals.

By 2015, we should see a new pedestrian/cycle bridge over the Thames. Design has started and a consultation is promised. A £20.6 million grant for sustainable transport will fund the bridge with other changes to increase journeys made on foot, by cycle or on buses. Details will be available via the CADRA website.

Local Policing

Inspector Phaedra J. Binns now heads up the Neighbourhood teams for Tilehurst, Caversham, Southcote and Norcot. In Caversham, she is supported by a Sergeant, three Police Constables and five PCSOs as listed on page 4. We congratulate Sgt Aziz on his promotion and look forward to hearing news of his successor.

After 18 years with the police service, Inspector Binns returns to Reading at her own request and is pleased to be back in the area. Her request to local people is to call in any people or activity you believe to be suspicious. Contact details for the team are shown on page 4. Among other issues reported over the past months were incidents related to doorstep selling, one of which resulted in a burglary.

Over the summer, the Caversham Community Alcohol Partnership implemented a new scheme designed to crack down on alcohol-related anti-social behaviour and under-age drinking. Working with schools, parents and retailers, this combined a programme of education, enforcement and work to change perceptions.

The two Neighbourhood Action groups continue to address local issues with burglary, speeding and parking.

Bus Services

From 2 July 2012, Route 22 buses reverted to their earlier route to Caversham Heights via Priest Hill rather than Hemdean Road and Oakley Road. The timetable remains the same at every 30 minutes throughout the day—a reduction from the 20 minute service up to September 2011. This has resulted in all bus stops in Caversham Heights being served again and a reduced journey. Unfortunately the service frequency in Hemdean Road is reduced. Reading Bus passes allow free travel on all local buses in the Reading urban area and free travel on local buses anywhere in England between 9.30am and 11pm Monday to Friday and at any time on weekends and bank holidays. You are eligible for a bus pass if your sixtieth birthday is on or before 5 April 2010. If your sixtieth birthday is after this date you can check when you become eligible at: http://pensions-service.direct.gov.uk/en/state-pension-age-calculator/home.asp

Bus passes are also issued for certain medical reasons or disabilities. These may also be used on Readibus if you meet their eligibility criteria. If you receive certain benefits or are accompanying someone with an eligible disability, you may qualify for free bus travel within the Reading urban area. For more information and an application form visit the reception at Reading Civic Centre.

Reading Station

The Station upgrade is very visible and is, according to Network Rail, a year ahead of schedule and due for completion at the end of 2015 instead of 2016.

Work started in July in Vastern Road to create a new traffic signalled junction for the northern interchange transport interchange for pedestrians, cyclists, taxi's and buses and a public square to compliment the new Northern Station entrance building.

A new north-south pedestrian link via the subway beneath Reading Station is also being built to give better pedestrian access to the town centre from Caversham.

The Vastern Road works include improvements to the footway and cycleway network, pedestrian crossing facilities and bus priority measures. The number of lanes for general traffic will remain. The Vastern Road and Interchange works

are programmed for completion in late spring 2013. It is anticipated that the public square will be completed in spring 2014.

We are pleased to note that the Council is now working with Network Rail to implement footpaths on both sides of the road through Cow Lane bridges.

Traffic and Parking

The Annual Waiting Restrictions Review includes consideration of a number of problem areas in Caversham including junctions where parking restricts drivers' visibility and controls on pavement parking by Caversham Court. If you have issues near you, it is not too late to raise these through your Ward Councillor.

A camera enforcement vehicle will assist enforcement in problem areas, including outside schools. For residents' parking schemes, there is consideration of a "virtual" system, replacing paper permits and application forms.

The Council is currently developing a local policy for 20mph speed limit areas.

The Council has a programme of visual audits (EVA) of local areas. Local people are welcome to join these and add their local knowledge to the record of items needing attention. Details can be found at:

Sometimes these audits identify shrubs or hedges overhanging the

highway which may result in a notice from the Council. If the plants endanger or obstruct the passage of vehicles or pedestrians, or obstruct or interfere with the view of drivers, the notice may require that the work is carried out within 14 days. There could be other implications if someone is injured by overhanging branches or has to step into the road to avoid them. This is an incentive to

us all to carry out some timely autumn pruning.

Planning

Caversham centre has seen a number of new applications. Work has started at 11 Gosbrook Road for seven flats. Next door, the Arthur Legge centre site has an application for eight flats. The proposal to demolish the Old Bakehouse on the corner of Rectory Road and Hemdean Road was refused by the Council and is now the subject of an appeal. These are all prominent sites with difficult access.
