Caversham and District Residents' Association Annual General Meeting Tuesday 11 June 2019 Chairman's report 2018/2019

Planning

As both Reading and South Oxfordshire progressed their Local Plans over the past year, there have been many issues for Caversham. Neither Plan has yet progressed to adoption. Across the border, the Gladman case would have opened the way for substantial development on the Reading border with major impacts on traffic and local services. CADRA put in both funds and time to support the CAGE campaign which was ultimately successful in blocking that particular application. With the increase in the housing requirement for South Oxfordshire, potential development on Reading's border will remain a key issue.

Much of Reading's housing requirement will be delivered through new high-rise buildings and we have reviewed where there may be an issue for Caversham or an opportunity to work with the Conservation Area Advisory Committee (CAAC).

Further progress on St Martins has been slow and the latest application has still not been resolved.

Local Heritage

CADRA has four members on the CAAC who work for Caversham issues and across Reading. The CADRA team led the work on the first CAAC re-appraisal, St Peters Conservation Area. After almost three years work, this resulted in the formal adoption of the revised appraisal, including an extension to take in Bridge Street, Caversham Bridge and Church Street up to the petrol station. It also established a basis for all other reappraisals and the CADRA team is currently assisting with the review of the Russel Street/Castle Hill area.

Very sadly Liz Killick, who did so much for both Planning and Local Heritage, died just after the adoption of the revised appraisal for St Peters Conservation Area. Although four of the team are engaged in planning issues, we would welcome a new member to join us.

Transport

Summer 2018 saw plans for further changes to Caversham Bus Services and a public meeting called at short notice drew hundreds of local people. More recently, CADRA had a positive meeting with the new CEO to discuss future communication. We continue to monitor decisions taken at the Traffic Management Sub Committee. The draft Local Transport Plan 4 has been delayed but a consultation on public transport and traffic issues is expected. Although Paul Matthews continues to provide advice, we would welcome a new member to help keep track of transport issues locally.

Safer Caversham

The Caversham Safer Neighbourhood Forum (previously Neighbourhood Action Group) meets regularly with representatives from the Police, RBC and community members including CADRA. It is an important mechanism for a combined proactive approach to local problems. Police resources are limited, and local people can help by providing local intelligence and by reporting crime. The allocation of resources is largely determined by the pattern of recorded crime.

Flood alleviation scheme

The proposed scheme would have a major impact on the land along the Thames. We urge local people to follow the proposals and to express their views. <u>https://www.cabfas.org/</u>

William Marshal – Information Panel

William Marshal has always been an important figure in Caversham history, but this year marks 800 years since his death in Caversham. We would like to thank everyone who has helped to launch the project to create an information panel. Reading Civic Society kindly agreed to receive donations and claim gift aid. Mike Eggleton helped to get the campaign off to a flying start. Vickie Abel, Chair of the Friends of Caversham Court Gardens has been a continuing support. Martin Andrews has produced the artwork and Anke Ueberberg, who also designs the CADRA newsletter, has brought excellent graphic design skills.

Planning permission will take some time and the attachment of the panel in its frame to the historic bridge requires careful investigation and some additional cost.
