## The William Marshal Panel

## Planning

New plans have been submitted to renovate the important listed buildings at **2-4 Church Street** (The Spice Oven), with a full restoration of the historic buildings at the front, supported by the creation of apartments to the rear. A previous application was rejected because of issues with the development at the rear. CADRA was influential in achieving sympathetic proposals for the frontage buildings, which the new application replicates, and we shall be commenting on the detail of this new application but generally support and welcome it. We opposed the application for a second hotel adjoining the **Crowne Plaza**, just over the river, because of its severe impact on views, especially from our Conservation Area. We are pleased to report that the application was refused on 11 December.

## EA Flood prevention scheme

CADRA is meeting the Environment Agency in January, before the next public engagement event. We want to understand the EA's reasoning and justification, and to get the clearest possible view of the scheme's impact before taking a view on the proposals.
