





# Round Up June 2025

We hope you enjoy this month's Round Up and as always please pass this on to anyone who may be interested and encourage them to join.

#### **PLANNING**

There is a controversial proposal for up to 70 homes west of **Kidmore End Road**, extending the current Reading Golf Club development into South Oxfordshire, with some protection for part of the rest of the course offered. This has already received many objections from both sides of the border.

There are three associated consultations for the proposal. (P25/S1431/O) is the main application to South Oxfordshire District Council (SODC) who will decide the application. The closing date for comments is 28 June, though an extension is expected in view of the website being down.

As access would be through Reading, application (PL/25/0691) has been submitted to RBC, who can only respond on access related matters. The closing date for this application is 12 June. Application (PL/25/0731) is where SODC are consulting RBC as the neighbouring authority, and RBC are seeking comments before responding to SODC. The closing date is 9 June. There may be some flexibility in accepting late comments on both these applications. CADRA has submitted Comments to both RBC applications and is developing comments to submit to SODC.

The other new application tells a different story of Caversham's development - at **The Fishery in The Warren** (PL/25/0751) a sympathetic and sensible restoration of a neglected listed building with 17th-18th century origins is proposed.

Updates on recent applications include approval for four family homes at **Atterbury Gardens** behind Richmond Road (PL/24/1659). The Planning Applications Committee had to balance the need for new family homes against concerns about traffic, and biodiversity offset payments that would be of no direct benefit to Reading.

After several years, restoration of the old **Spice Oven 2-4 Church Street** (PL/23/1257) was permitted. This allows some rear demolition and reconfiguration to create flats and commercial units, plus improvements to the street scene which respect the building's heritage.

Essential infrastructure work was approved for **Caversham Court's** east boundary wall (<u>PL/25/0606</u>). This major structural work includes partial rebuilding and new drainage to prevent the listed wall's collapse, though concerns remain about several previously lost trees and their replacement.

In **George Street**, Thames Valley Service Station's proposed digital advertising screen was refused (<u>PL/25/0468</u>), on grounds of driver distraction and visual intrusion.

## Oxfordshire Councils' Reorganisation Proposals

Following the government's decision to abolish district councils, three alternatives have been put forward for Oxfordshire. Five councils - West Berkshire, Cherwell, South Oxfordshire, Vale of White Horse and West Oxfordshire - have jointly proposed splitting the region into "Oxford and Shires Council" (covering Cherwell, Oxford City and West Oxfordshire) and "Ridgeway Council" (covering West Berkshire, South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse). Oxford City Council suggests three authorities including a "Greater Oxford Council" with green belt control. Oxfordshire County Council proposes one unified authority. This biggest local government shake-up since 1972, whilst not specifically involving Reading, may well impact planning policy and other areas (Source BBC News Item).

#### **ROADS AND TRAFFIC**

#### **Kidmore Road Sink Hole**

A month after work was supposed to start, Thames Water has told residents that starting on 9 June, specialist contractors will conduct site inspections, ground testing and equipment setup to prepare for future ground stabilisation work. No indication of a completion date was provided. Twelve weeks was previously quoted.

# **Reading Considers Emission-Based Parking Charges**

Reading Council is proposing higher parking fees for more polluting vehicles to improve air quality and public health. They aim to encourage cleaner transport options alongside broader walking, cycling and public transport improvements. Similar schemes already operate in London Boroughs and the City of Bath. Petrol vehicles would face 20% incremental charges and diesel vehicles 25%, based on CO2 emissions over 151g/km.

RBC's March consultation received 275 responses, with mixed views on parking permits but 64% expressing concern about air quality's health impacts. Notably, 20% said the scheme would likely change their driving behaviour. Councillors will review the consultation results on 11 June and decide on the <u>next steps</u>, potentially including statutory consultation.

#### THE RIVER

### **Lock Keepers Voted for Strike Action**

The Environment Agency lock keepers on the River Thames have voted to strike because of safety concerns over the fall in their numbers, and the River Users Group 4/5 and River Thames Society have both written letters of support.

The lock keepers have a number of important roles. Their unavailability will have an impact on summer boating, but residents may be more concerned about who will open the weir gates in the event of heavy rainfall. This could have an impact on river heights and so we hope the Environment Agency and the lock keepers can reach a rapid agreement.

## Reading Amateur Regatta 14th and 15th June

Dating from 1842, this is Reading's oldest sporting event. As always, the finish line will be across the river from Caversham Court Gardens. The crews will be racing from 9am to 7pm each day. Crews from Australia and the USA come to race in Reading before moving on to Henley Women's Regatta. The best views of the Regatta are from Thames Promenade and it is free to watch.

## Regatta Vintage Fayre 14th and 15th June

While the rowing takes place across the river, this year the Caversham side springs to life! With a vibrant atmosphere, delicious food & drinks, a craft market, and plenty of entertainment, the weekend will offer something for everyone. Whether cheering on the rowers or simply soaking up the riverside views, it's the perfect way to spend a summer weekend.

### **Our River Thames Exhibition**

Royal Berkshire Archives at 9 Coley Avenue is hosting an exhibition exploring our history and interaction with the River Thames from 11 June - 29 August (Tues - Thurs 9am -5pm). Exhibits include those from the Reading Amateur Regatta Archive.
